

# Facts and Figures





The Free and Hanseatic City of Hamburg is Germany's second largest city following Berlin. It is, at the same time, one of the states of the Federal Republic of Germany, called *Länder*. The city is located on the North German Plain in the lower reaches of the Elbe River, about 100 km from where the Elbe meets the North Sea.

# **Environment**

Hamburg is a green city. 16.8 per cent of the municipal area is made up of parks, recreation areas and woodlands with bodies of water accounting for a further 8.0 per cent, thus contributing significantly to the city's recreational value. 61.4 square kilometres (8.1 per cent) are declared national parks, an additional 144.5 square kilometres (19.1 per cent) nature reserves. Eco farming, fruit growing and horticulture account for yet another six percent of the Hamburg municipal area.

In 2007, 10.9 million tons of carbon dioxide were emitted in Hamburg, 1.8 million tons less than in 1990. 1,600 tons were emitted by private households.

Hamburg's industrial units invested 45.8 million euros in measures aimed at the protection of the environment (4.8 per cent of total investments) in the year 2006. 24.1 million euros of which were invested into measures aiming at the protection of water.

# HAMBURG METROPOLITAN AREA

In addition to the city of Hamburg 14 other areas form part of the Metropolitan Area. This includes the districts Dithmarschen, Duchy of Lauenburg, Pinneberg, Segeberg, Steinburg and Stormarn, all of which lie north of the Elbe River in the federal state of Schleswig-Holstein. To the south this includes the districts Cuxhaven, Harburg, Lüchow-Dannenberg, Lüneburg, Rotenburg (Wümme), Soltau-Fallingbostel, Stade and Uelzen, all of which belong to the federal state of Lower Saxony. The Metropolitan Area covers a total area of 19,801 sq km and has a population of 4.3 million.

# PARLIAMENT AND GOVERNMENT

The City-State Parliament is known as the *Bürgerschaft*. The last elections to the *Bürgerschaft* held on February 24<sup>th</sup> in 2008 and February 29<sup>th</sup> in 2004 delivered following results:

The Senat is the state government.

Christoph Ahlhaus (CDU) is Lord Mayor, Christa Goetsch (GRÜNE/GAL) is Deputy Mayor. In addition to the Lord and Deputy Mayors eight senators make up the Senate body.

# PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION

Hamburg is divided into seven administrative districts: Hamburg-Mitte, Altona, Eimsbüttel, Hamburg-Nord, Wandsbek, Bergedorf and Harburg.

Civil Servants in the service of the *Freie und Hansestadt Hamburg*: 71,876 (32.5 % of which are part-time employees). 31.368 are employed in the school, college and university system.

The annual **tax revenue** amounts to 45 billion Euros. This figure includes federal and community taxes. Hamburg's actual remaining tax income amounts to totalling nearly eight billion Euros.

# MUNICIPAL SECURITY

9,802 police officers, of which 2,597 are women, work for the Hamburg Police Department and are in charge of the city's security.


2,277 firemen are employed by the Hamburg Fire Brigade as well as another 2,595 firefighters who are active in 87 Volunteer Fire Departments.

# **CULTURE**

The Hamburg Opera and two state theatres with a total attendance number of 870,636 during the 2007/2008 season; furthermore, 23 private theatres.

27 cinemas (78 screens) totalling 4.8 million visitors.

Planetarium totalling 339,205 visitors, seven Hamburg museum foundations totalling nearly 1.2 million visitors; and additionally 40 public and private museums.

The foundation "Hamburg public libraries" maintains 36 libraries (among them 1 central library and 32 district libraries, of which 2 are mobile). The total inventory comprises more than 1.6 million books, cassettes, games and music notes, with the annual number of items borrowed adding up to totalling nearly 13.5 million.

# **SPORTS**

240 sports fields with a total of roughly 330 playing fields and 683 gymnasiums (2006).

26 swimming pools run by the "Bäderland Hamburg GmbH" totalling more than of 4.2 million visitors.

The Hamburg Sports Association with 799 clubs totalling 533,981 members. Most popular sports (according to number of members): gymnastics (144,044), football (55,143), tennis (27,102).

# **SOCIAL FACILITIES**


There are children's day-care centres and children's care facilities with a capacity totalling 75,640, 280 youth work facilities, 51 hospitals with a total bed capacity of 11,666, 149 in-patient care facilities with 17,292 beds, 84 meeting places for senior citizens and 363 out-patient and home-care facilities and 386 day care facilities.

# The Media and Information Technology

Hamburg is a leading centre of the German media industry. 13,073 firms in Hamburg belong to this industrial sector according to a chamber of commerce study. These include 7,362 advertising firms, 2,342 printing and publishing companies, 920 film and motion picture companies, 2,369 recording and culturally involved companies, 76 radio and TV broadcasting companies. According to a survey by the Hamburg Chamber of Commerce 8,455 IT companies are based in Hamburg.

### Trade

Foreign trade generated by Hamburg-based industries totalled an annual 53,900 billion Euro in imports, thus accounting for 8.0 per cent of Germany's total import trade and 31,300 billion Euros in exports, thus accounting for 3.9 per cent of Germany's total export trade.

65,960 persons are in 2007 employed in the **wholesale industry**, an area with an annual turnover of 98,700 billion Euros. The **retail industry** employs 100,110 persons and accounts for an annual turnover of 18.9 billion Euros in 2008.

### Hotels and Restaurants

The hotel and restaurant business employs 2008 total 27,860 persons and accounts for an annual turnover of 1.4 billion Euros. Total hotel capacity amounts 2009 to 42,845 beds. Hamburg hotels and pensions total 4.4 million guests and 8.2 million overnight stays.

# Insurances

Traditionally, Hamburg is a major centre for insurance corporations, whereby life insurance, credit and transport insurance account for the bulk of business. The *Hamburger Feuerkasse*, founded in 1676, is the oldest insurance in the world.

# **Aviation**

With the aircraft construction corporation, *Airbus Deutschland GmbH*, and *Lufthansa Technik AG*, supplying aircraft engineering services Hamburg is one of the largest aviation industry locations in the world.

# Manufacturing Industry

462 companies belong to Hamburg's manufacturing industry according to the new classification of industries (WZ 2008), employing 83 000 people. Annual overall turnover adds up to 53.5 billion euros. Industries employing most people are – including dedicated repair companies – the air and spacecraft industry employing 20 000 people and the engineering industry with 12 500 people employed.

## **Construction Business**

Among the world's leading container ports, Hamburg ranks as the 9th largest container port in the world. Up to 7.0 million containers (20-foot units) are transshipped with a total weight of 57.2 million tonnes.

# CONGRESSES AND TRADE FAIRS

The Hamburg Trade Fair and Congress Co. annually organises and handles about 45 trade fairs, about 300 conventions and events in the CCH-Congress Center Hamburg with a total of 1.1 million participants.

Fair grounds comprise a capacity of 87,000 square meters of exhibition space within eleven halls; additionally there are 10,000 square meters of open-air exhibition ground. The CCH offers a total of 12,500 seats in 23 separable halls as well as 10 000 square meters of exhibition space.

# **MARKETS**

The Hamburg wholesale market fruit, vegetables and flowers reaches 15 Million consumers. In the year 2009, some 292,000 tonnes of fruit were sold totalling 372 million Euros in value as well as approximately 354,000 tonnes of vegetables worth 391 million Euros.

At the central flower market flowers were sold totalling 90 million Euros.

The *Dom* amusement fair comes to town in spring, summer and autumn, attracting approximately between nine and ten million fun-loving visitors regularly.

# **HISTORY**

First settlements date back to the 7th century (near today's city centre).

The Hammaburg Castle was built in early 9th century.

- 1189 (7 May) Emperor Barbarossa gives city royal charter, guaranteeing free river and sea trade
- 1321 Hamburg becomes member of Hanseatic League
- 1529 Reformation (Bugenhagen)
- 1558 Hamburg Stock Exchange established
- 1618 Hamburg becomes "free city of the Empire"
- 1678 Foundation of Germany's first opera
- 1815 Hamburg becomes member of German Federation as (since 1819) *Freie und Hansestadt*
- 1842 (5 8 May) One third of city area destroyed by Great Fire
- 1888 Hamburg joined customs authority of "German Reich"; and installation of Free Port Zone with its famed Speicherstadt (warehouse complex)
- 1892 Cholera epidemic
- 1910 The population figure of the Hamburg city-state surpasses the one million mark
- 1937 Greater Hamburg Bill: Incorporation of Altona, Harburg-Wilhelmsburg, Wandsbek and other areas under Prussian rule until then
- 1939- In the Second World War about 55,000 people
- 1945 loose their lives in the air raids, more than half of all housing is destroyed.
- 1952 The new constitution of Hamburg is put into power 1st July
- 1962 Flood catastrophe claims 340 victims, in Hamburg 317
- 1996 Hamburg becomes the seat of the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea
