### **University History**

The University of Fine Arts - Hochschule für bildende Künste (HFBK Hamburg) was established in 1767 by the Patriotische Gesellschaft (Patriotic Society) as a vocational school. In 1896, it became a state art vocational school, and subsequently became a state art school. The main building at Lerchenfeld, in Hamburg's Uhlenhorst district, was built by the architect Fritz Schumacher, beginning in 1911 and concluding in 1913. During the National Socialist period, the institution's name was changed to "the Hansische Hochschule für bildende Künste" (the Hanseatic University of Fine Arts). In 1945, after the Second World War, regular teaching was resumed under the name "Landeskunstschule" (or State Art School). In 1955, this was changed to "the Hochschule für Bildende Künste" (University of Fine Arts). Since 1970, the institution has enjoyed the status of an artistic/academic university. Two further University buildings can be found close to the main building at Lerchenfeld: the "Finkenau" building, where the film department facilities are located, and the "Wartenau" building, where the rooms of the foundation classes and the student administration are situated.

## The curriculum and the workshops

The following courses are offered at the HFBK Hamburg: Bachelor of Fine Arts (degree qualification: Bachelor of Fine Arts) and Master of Fine Arts (degree qualification Master of Fine Arts), Bachelor of Education (Bachelor of Science) and conferral of the doctorate Dr. phil. in art.

Students are assigned to one of the specialist courses and to an individual class or university lecturer according to their artistic interests. As ERASMUS students, you will also be assigned to a class or university lecturer while you are studying at HFBK Hamburg. However, it is possible (and also desirable!) for all students to participate in an additional specialist courses. This transferability between specialist courses is an important part of the HFBK Hamburg's interdisciplinary course structure.

The Bachelor and Master of Visual Arts programs encompass the following specialist courses:

- Sculpture
- Stage Design
- Design
- Film
- Graphics/Typography/Photography
- Painting/Drawing
- Theory and History
- Time-based Media



The students at HFBK Hamburg are free to decide for themselves whether they combine different specialist courses or concentrate on a single one. This openness allows for a great degree of flexibility, and makes it possible to develop an individual artistic and/or scientific profile.

The HFBK Hamburg's various workshops include workshops for metal, plastic, wood, ceramics, porcelain, screen-printing, textiles and video work. The HFBK Hamburg also has a photo laboratory. In theory, all HFBK Hamburg students are granted access to the workshops upon consultation with the workshop leaders. However, students must have previously participated in an introductory course. You should sign up by adding your name to the workshop course lists that are displayed on walls at the earliest possible opportunity.

## **Enrolment and public transport**

For ERASMUS students only: please contact the International Office about being issued with your enrolment or registration documents, which you will receive once you have paid your semester contribution. This is payable to the account: Deutsche Bundesbank, Sort Code 200 000 00, account no. 201 015 46. For transaction from an international account, you will need the following codes: BIC: MARKDEF1200 IBAN: DE 512 000 000 000 201 015 46. For the summer semester of 2016, the amount payable by ERASMUS students will be € 261.10 (incl. semester ticket). The semester ticket can be used on the entire HVV public transport net throughout the semester. You can use all metro lines and tram lines, buses and night bus services (with the exception of 1st class and "express buses"). The reduced-cost travel ticket is included in the semester contribution, plus a small administration fee. International students receive their documents and semester ticket automatically from the students' administration office.

#### Semester dates

The HFBK Hamburg's academic year is divided into the winter semester and the summer semester. The compulsory period for lecture attendance in the winter semester starts on 1<sup>st</sup> October and finishes at the beginning of March. In the summer semester, it starts on 1<sup>st</sup> April and ends in the middle of July. During the compulsory period, the University is open around the clock. During the semester break, it is open from 7 am to 10 pm. You can also use the rooms and equipment at HFBK Hamburg when lectures are not taking place.

### Library

The library is located on the second floor of the main building (Lerchenfeld). It is a reference library, which means that, as a rule, the books cannot be taken outside the library. In exceptional cases books can be borrowed over the weekend. Anyone who wants or needs to work intensively with specific literature over a longer period of time should contact the following Hamburg libraries to apply for a library pass:

### Accommodation in Hamburg

Finding good-value accommodation in Hamburg can take up much more time than one might initially think. It is recommended that you find suitable accommodation as early as possible - and certainly before you actually arrive! - especially if your knowledge of German is not very extensive.

• The HFBK Hamburg has a number of rooms for ERASMUS students with the Studierendenwerk Hamburg, which is responsible for student halls of residence: http://www.studierendenwerk-hamburg.de/application/index.php?mid=456&&sprache=english. You have already been



contacted, and the application deadline for the regular student halls has expired for this semester. If you are interested in taking student accommodation, please register in time for the coming semester.

If you have already arrived in Hamburg, however, and are in urgent need of accommodation, you should try the following possibilities:

- Those of you who have not yet rented a room could contact the administrators of individual student halls of residence directly and ask to be given the use of a "guest room" until you find other accommodation. <a href="https://www.studierendenwerk-hamburg.de">www.studierendenwerk-hamburg.de</a>
- Look at private adverts. You can find these on the notice boards at HFBK Hamburg, but also in the "Uni" (Universität Hamburg). It is also recommended that you place your own advert. Important: The start of the week is the best time to look for accommodation (certainly you should not do your looking on a Friday, as everything is removed from the bulletin boards on Friday). ## Getting registered in Hamburg

Once you have found accommodation, you should register your residency as soon as possible. You can do this at the "Einwohnermeldeamt" (residency registration office) in the district office responsible for the area where you live. In order to register at the residency registration office, you will need the following documents:

- your valid rental agreement
- your passport or personal identity card

Alternatively, you can make an appointment at the Hamburg Welcome Center, where you can also be registered (additionally, you can be issued with a certificate of freedom of movement and renew your residence permit at this center):

Once you have registered, you will receive a certificate of registration (the "Meldebestätigung"), which you should keep in a safe place. You will need this in order to:

- Renew your visa
- Open a bank account
- Use the libraries
- Finalize contracts (e.g. mobile phone contracts)

#### Health insurance

Health insurance is obligatory for students in Germany. Health insurance is a compulsory requirement for enrolment at HFBK Hamburg.

#### • EU citizens:

Citizens of EU countries can usually continue to be covered by their health insurance plan from their own home nation, as long as they have a European health insurance card. You will need a document from a German health insurance provider certifying that your non-German insurance plan is valid in Germany.

#### • Non-EU citizens:

**Statutory health insurance:** As a rule, it is more cost-effective to insure yourself with one of the statutory health insurance companies. For students insured with any of the statutory health insurance companies, the contributions are included in the family insurance up to 25 years of age. If the student is 25 or older it costs 77.90 €. There is hardly any difference in the services provided by the different statutory health insurance companies.

**Private health insurance:** Some students are not entitled to statutory health insurance, and must insure themselves privately: for example, students who are over 30 years old or who have been university students for more than 14 semesters, and doctorate students. In order to find out which rules apply to



you, please make enquiries with health insurance companies. Private health insurance offers some very cost-effective tariffs - which, however, do not generally offer the same range of services as statutory insurance. Before you sign up for private health insurance, please enquire as to whether the health insurance offers the standard tariff according to § 315 SGB V (Social Security Code V). Only then can you be sure that your insurance can help you in all cases of emergency.

Anyone who is privately insured within their own country or within Germany and who is not yet 30 years old will need a statutory health insurance exemption certificate.

#### Bank account

It is very easy to open a bank account. You will need the following documents:

- passport or identity card
- certificate of registration ("Meldebestätigung")
- Student's identity card or enrolment proof (most banks offer accounts with no fees for students).

#### German courses

International and ERASMUS students can attend German language courses, for example offered by the Volkshochschule Hamburg in cooperation with the Universität Hamburg/ HafenCity University. Please retain your certificates of course attendance and your invoice – HFBK Hamburg might refund a part of the course fees if you can attest that you attended at least 80% of the course units or that you passed the final test. ### Food

At the HFBK Hamburg Cafeteria, you can eat and drink at a reasonable price. The cafeteria offers a range of warm meals, including one vegetarian meal every day and different snacks. Opposite from the main entrance of the HFBK Hamburg, a market is held twice a week (Tuesdays and Fridays) where you can buy fresh food. Lots of other refectories can be found on the Hamburg University campus, near the Dammtor railway station.

### Part-time work

#### Student discounts

Your status as a student makes you eligible for a range of discounts. Usually you just have to present your student identity card. Here is a small overview of the discount possibilities:

- newspaper subscriptions (newspaper and magazines are up to 50% cheaper)
- computers (price discounts when buying a computer, shopping vouchers, etc.)
- travel (rail travel and also air travel)
- cinema, theatre, opera, musical and concert tickets
- entrance to the Kunsthalle (Gallery of Art) is free of charge for HFBK Hamburg students
